Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome back and Happy New Year! I trust you all enjoyed the break as much as we teachers did – though I suspect it wasn't quite as restful for you as it was for us!! 2020 is an exciting year for us as it's the year we're hoping that Ofsted will declare us as a 'Good' school – to be clear, we **are** a good school but we just haven't got the rubber stamp from Ofsted yet!

But I really need to begin this week's newsletter with a shout out to all the parents who rallied round on Wednesday after school when the worst nightmare for any parent *actually* occurred for one of our own. One of our Reception children was collected by their adult at home time but, as the adult walked through the playground towards Rainsford Way gate, he suddenly noticed that his ward was no longer by his side. He returned to Miss Goodwin in the hope of finding him back at his class but he wasn't there. At this point, panic set in for our parent but I have to applaud our staff (teachers, TAs and office staff) who immediately set off to search for our little adventurer. Not only did staff step into gear but so did all the parents still left in the playground. Parents ran around the school grounds, staff ran around the school building, parents *and* staff went out on foot and in cars searching the streets for any sign of our missing child. Police were called and we heard the sirens within a couple of minutes. Parents came up to me one after the other offering assistance. Eventually our worried parent received a call from his sister to say that our little traveller had made his way home all on his own! Panic over and we all breathed a sigh of relief but many things were learned from this incident – firstly, children aren't frightened of going it alone and don't see the dangers of the big wide world so keep your eyes on them **all** the time; secondly, the police are amazing when it comes to swift response for missing children; thirdly, it's said that you find out who your real friends are when you're in a crisis and *you* all proved yourselves to be loyal and firm friends during this crisis and I feel honoured to have friends like you. One of our enterprising year 5 boys had caught me in the playground at lunch time with a bright idea to encourage children to keep up our high standards of uniform – he suggested that we carry out random spot-checks every now and then to check uniform compliance.
