Dear Parents and Carers,

Another week of drama and spectacle has unfolded in Harrow Lodge Primary this week and, as usual, nothing has been straightforward. However, as Mrs Lawson said to me, it would be a boring life if everything were straightforward – Mrs Lawson, ladies and gentlemen, the eternal optimist and glass half-full individual who always keeps me from sinking into despair!

So, Monday began with an enjoyable visit to 1A and 1B who were following a 'Votes for Schools' lesson. Basically, these are lessons that elicit discussion around current affairs or current issues. Tuesday was another great win for Harrow Lodge Primary as we steamed ahead in the Year 4 Tag Rugby Tournament only to walk away as outright winners! Go Year 4! This tournament involved every Primary School in Havering. Our team played around 10 matches losing only 1! Poor Mr Charlee missed out on seeing the win, though, as he was needed for teaching in school so Mrs Kerr had the joy of walking away with the trophy!! Life's unfair sometimes, Mr Charlee, but you'll be at the next one, hopefully. Well done to all the Year 4 team and a big thank you to Mrs Kerr who stood in as coach at the last minute. Sympathy to Mr Charlee who waved goodbye to the team with a tear in his eye!!

Tuesday and Wednesday were our Parents' Evenings and it was lovely to see so many of you coming in and looking at the wonderful homework displays. The work is of such a high standard – you must be very proud parents. I hope you managed to get a look at *all* the homework – it's great to see the progression from EYFS to Year 6 in all aspects of the work. And how amazing was the Parentview set-up? All the laptops working, all the log-ins working (well, after the first 1 or 2 hitches) and everyone able to access the new set of questions with ease! Now, there's a first!! Thanks to all of you who completed the survey – if you didn't get to do it, you can still go on at home, login with your own details and complete the survey to allow other parents to see what you think of the school. Furthermore, you can go onto the Parentview site and click 'Ofsted Parent View results' for our school. If you click 'print results', the results for each question come up and you can see what outsiders will see about Harrow Lodge Primary when they're browsing for schools. I have to say that the picture is looking very good overall but there are still a few parents who wouldn't recommend the school to others which is rather concerning for me as those parents are obviously not happy with some aspect of the school and yet I'm not aware of it which means I can't improve it. As our strategic plan is to have the very best school in the area, I do need to know what the problems are if I'm going to be able to put them right. So, I have a plea to make – if you are one of the parents who *wouldn't* recommend the school to outsiders, do please come in and speak with me so that we can work together to make your child's experience at this school the best it can be for the 7 years, hopefully, they spend with us. Wednesday saw the best Fire Drill **ever** – 2 minutes 48 seconds all out and in silence. We had a visitor in the school on that morning and she said, "I've been in many schools when they've had fire drills and this is by far the best one I've ever seen – the children were so well-behaved and so quick!" And she was right – a few little measures to improve where allocating jobs is concerned but, other than that, a nearly perfect drill. I say 'nearly' because we did have to wait an extraordinarily long time in the freezing cold (after we were out so quickly) while Ms Haynes tried to figure out how to *stop* the fire bell – at one point, I thought we were going to end up having our lunch out there on the playground! All was sorted, though, I'm glad to say, and *that* little problem shouldn't occur next time (fingers crossed)!! Following that excellent drill, I sat in my office trying to warm up my bones and I was disappointed to hear what can only be described as a 'rabble' of children racing past my door. I put it down to the excitement of the fire alarm and continued with my work only to hear, twenty minutes later, a stampede of little feet accompanied with excited high pitched squeals. Well, I'm sorry but no fire drill is an excuse for such deafening hyperactivity within a calm working space! So, out I marched, following the

large, disorderly mob straight into the KS2 hall ready to reprimand them for such outrageously excitable behaviour, only to find Miss Harrison, clipboard in hand, carrying out auditions for our talent show! That stopped me in my tracks – clearly, the overzealous, wild-like behaviour was down to the nervous state of children on a mission to impress with their singing, dancing or baton-twirling talents. I returned to my office and ignored any further comings and goings of tense and anxious children racing past my door. It's a small price to pay for such a wonderful show – coming to our screens on the 1st of April in a High School near *you* (that's Hornchurch High, in case you were wondering)! Wednesday was a busy day, actually, because we also celebrated World Maths Day by carrying out activities linked to the theme 'Maths is Everywhere'. There were a plethora of activities including activities using budgets, timetables, timezones, weighing, discounting, statistics, map-reading, converting measures and, *my personal favourite*, recipes (a rather tasty spaghetti bolognese graced my table at the end of the day)!!

Thursday, of course, was World Book Day (I do think the World should start planning its days rather more carefully – 2 major days in the same week is just thoughtless if you ask me!) Well, the effort that some of you and your children go to for Character Day just fills me with admiration – it's a testament to your commitment and dedication in the extreme. Everyone looked wonderful and Ms McLaughlin organised a green screen event for Year 3 – we await the results with bated breath! I had the wonderful opportunity to read a story to Year 3 & 4 – I chose one of my favourites, 'Midnight for Charlie Bone' which is about a boy who hears voices – I think I can relate to him since I hear voices all day - "Can you do this Mrs Searle? Have you done that Mrs Searle?" Each teacher also swapped their class with another teacher so classes could hear stories read to them by different teachers. The children *loved* it – the teachers.... Not so much! It's daunting facing 30 unknown faces full of hope and expectation awaiting a performance of epic proportions!! Still, the likes of Miss Howard, Mrs Law, Mrs Millard, Miss Harrison and Miss Goodwin need no encouragement at all and it's a delight to be entertained by them! Now, you may or may not be aware that each class is competing for a large hamper of books for their book corner which they'll win if they produce the most imaginative 'Extreme Reading Pose' so yesterday was a hive of activity as children searched high and low for unusual places to sit and read their books. Well, it won't be hard to imagine my surprise when I walked into my office to find Olivia (6B) sitting by my bin, Catalina (6B) atop my tall cupboard, Ellie (6B) upside down (yes, *upside down!*) in a back bend on my table while James and Andre (6B) crossed swords in the corner of the room, all engrossed in reading their books! Now, many of you have noticed our new Core Value signs in the outside entranceway but what I bet you *didn't* notice was the deliberate mistake! But I'm most excited about our school prayer which is proudly displayed in the Entrance Hall – it's beautiful and really states what we want our school to be like.

Finally, today, 4A are on their visit to the Tower of London as part of their 'Off with her Head' topic – here's hoping none of our teachers lose their heads on the trip – that would be a disaster! But, while 4A have been away, 4B are putting in extra practice with their times tables – they're determined to annihilate 4A at Timestables Rockstars and they've made a jolly good start. Today's total stands at 4A – 1,925 points and 4B – 31,607 points. Come on 4A – time to catch up!!
