Weekly News

Dear Parents and Carers,

An exciting week at Harrow Lodge this week. Here are the highlights!

- Last week's MacMillan coffee afternoon was a great success as you know but there

- Year 2 watched a live stream of Harvest Fest '23 on Wednesday. They learned how to make 'saag paneer' and delved into the Science of the ingredients involved in the dish. They got to see and explore where/how onions and spinach grow and the processes they go through when being harvested and sold. They also explored Indian cottage cheese and learnt about the food group that it belongs to and where dairy products come from. They also visited a cow farm to see how milk was extracted from cows not sure many of them are going to aspire to be dairy farmers after that but they certainly learnt a lot!
- In EYFS, Ms Goodwin read a story called 'The Fish that could Wish', and one of the wishes the fish made was a silly wish.
