Me and My Community – EYFS

My friend

Thank you card

There are lots of people in our community who help us e.g. doctor, nurse, firefighter, police officer, delivery driver, shop worker, paramedic, teacher. Choose one and make a thank you card for them.

This half term we will be learning:

Communication and language	Listening and attention, understanding, speaking The children will be learning that they are part of the school community and will explore together what the word community means. They will go for a walk around the school, in small groups, so that they can meet people in the school community who are there to help them. The children will find out who each of the people they meet are and what they do in the school. The children will be given the opportunity to talk to and ask questions of the people that they meet. Later on, they will learn about the other people who help them in the local community e.g. Fire officers, Doctors, Dentists etc.
Physical Development	The children will be given the opportunity to help set up an obstacle course in the garden, so that they can travel over, under and through.
Personal, social and emotional development	The children will be encouraged to bring in photographs of their family; friends; pets; favourite food and or favourite places, to add to their own Marvellous Me boards. In small groups, the children will share their boards and the children will be supported to find similarities and differences between their boards and their friends.
Literacy	Reading The children will be hearing different stories about starting school, friendships and families. While listening to the different stories, the children will be asked to predict what might happen next, at various points. After reading the stories, the children will comment on what they liked about it. Writing They will use shaving foam or cornflour gloop and their name cards to copy patterns and make marks, using different tools as well as their fingers.
Mathematics	Numbers and Shape, space and measures The children will learn the song 'ten in the bed' and use this to help them put the teddies in order from 1 to 10. They will take part in a simple instruction game to move around an area, by following the instructions e.g. 'Take three steps forward. Turn around, now take four steps back'. After playing the game they will work with a partner to give each other simple commands. The children begin to learn about subitising to five, by recognising the number they can see without counting.
Understanding the world	Companion project – Exploring Autumn This project teaches children about the natural changes that happen during the season of autumn, including how the weather changes, why trees lose their leaves and how wild animals prepare for winter.
Expressive arts and design	Exploring and using media and materials, being imaginative The children will learn about colour mixing with a friend. They will be given a large sheet of paper to decorate, red, blue and yellow paint. They will each choose a colour to paint their hands with and will be asked what they think might happen if they hold hands with someone else who has a painted hand. The children to hold 'painty' hands and see what happens. They will then print their handprints onto paper to make patterns. The children will be challenged to see if they can make all of the colours of the rainbow
