Dear Parents and Carers,

Another busy week. Here are the highlights:

- It was Spanish Challenge week this week and all our children have been trying to answer the register and order their lunches in Spanish. This didn't include our Reception children as we're still working hard at getting them to answer correctly in English so Spanish might be a tad confusing for the moment! We're still battling against orders of chicken nuggets and chips with jelly for dessert when no such
- This week EYFS have taken part in an experiment that required the children to engage in an open discussion aimed at developing their critical thinking skills. As part of the National Thinking Classroom Program, the children were asked the following question, 'Is zero a number?' Their responses were so interesting, Sofia (R1), 'Well zero means nothing. How can something that is nothing be something?' Followed by Nailah (R1), 'Well, it must be a number because it's on our number lines and it comes before the number one!' We're starting that critical thinking early!
- Also this week, Mr Dobisz (Oliver's [3A] dad) came in to speak to our Year 6 children about Agnosticism. As you know, last week, we had a parent sharing their Muslim faith with us and Mr Dobisz shared his beliefs with us. It was one of the most interesting discussions I've had in a long time. The children were reflective and honest with their contributions and I hope that such discussions help our children to understand the importance of evaluating all religious beliefs with an open mind and a tolerant heart.
- 2B have done a great job this week writing letters of complaint to a fictional Head Teacher from the perspective of Bill (in his new frock!) about unjust ways that gender stereotyping took place in the storybook school. Amelie wrote how confused and offended Bill was that only boys were chosen to help with moving tables and chairs after assembly. This is quite a timely discussion in light of the social media trend suggesting that 'boys are better than girls'!

- Now, I tend to be a very positive person, preferring to celebrate the good rather than complain about the bad but I'm afraid, this week, I'm going to have to break that pattern on account of the events of Thursday when we invited the 'Two Johns' into school to talk to children, staff and parents about the dangers of the internet and how to keep our children safe. These two gentlemen were ex-police officers whose main duties had been searching for and apprehending predators of young children and they had now moved into the business of raising awareness across the country about the serious dangers of the internet that are hidden in plain site. They held workshops with Years 1 & 2, 3 & 4 and 5 & 6. We were shocked at the knowledge your children had and that they were very open about the fact that they don't let their parents know what they watch, who they play games with and what they know how to do on phones, tablets and other electronic devices. One year 1 child told the presenters exactly how to reinstall an App their parent had removed and how to hide it on the device so their parent wouldn't remove it again!! That's a 5 year old child! The two Johns trained the teachers after school and some of the statistics were truly shocking. For example, since the pandemic, the number of online sexual abuse cases of *primary* school children has increased by 1000%. That's a scary statistic! And most of them are tricked into it, not even realising that it's happening! It's a whole calculated process by the bad guys!
- For me, however, the really big eye-opener was the effect of YouTube influencers on your children. The presenters showed a set of 20 on-line influencers to the children and they knew *all* of them (/ didn't know *any* of them!) and the children follow everything they do or suggest. At the moment, one of the biggest trends is 'boys are better than girls' and girls don't need to worry about getting a job when they're older because they'll just marry a rich man who will provide for them! And *many* of our Year 5 & 6 girls agreed with this point of view! The presenters told us that they see this attitude in *every* school they visit and that we should expect to see a gradual fall in the standards of girls' attainment over the next few years because of this radicalisation (the belief that they don't need to work because they'll marry rich). Well, as you know, we've already started to see this decline in *our* school and we've been scrutinising our teaching methods, researching how to higher girls' aspiration and inviting professional women into school to motivate our girls. Not *once* did we think to look outside of ourselves and consider social media influence; but here we are!
- After the day's workshops and staff training, I was eager to welcome parents to the school in the evening to hear the two Johns and to get their advice on how we can support our children through this internet minefield. You can imagine my disappointment when Mrs Harding told me that only 5 parents had booked to attend the meeting! As if that wasn't disappointment enough, none of them turned up and not one of them sent apologies! I was devastated and embarrassed

- but, more than that, I was disappointed that we were letting our children down because, without the knowledge the presenters were sharing, parents won't know how to tackle this growing danger. Luckily, 3 parents who hadn't booked did turn up and I'm sure, if you ask them, they will tell you that it was well worth the visit (and they were all parents of infant children which is where the training needs to begin!) I don't want to dwell on this part of the newsletter but I would like respectfully request that, if you ever book any kind of appointment or place at a meeting, do please send apologies if you can't make it so that we're not waiting around for you. And, lastly, on this note, although there was such a huge wealth of information shared with parents that I can't cover here, the presenters told me that, if I could only share one piece of information with parents, it should be this: the most dangerous Apps for your children to access or use are TikTok (the very worst), WhatsApp and Discord. The 'Bad people' (as the presenters called them) know exactly how to target and trick children, remaining undetected, using TikTok and Discord and WhatsApp is the very worst platform for bullying. Next week, Squirrels Heath, St Joseph's, Brady, Branfil and Drapers Mayland are holding parent meetings with the two Johns. If you know anyone in those schools and can squeeze into one of their meetings, you'll be doing your child a favour, I promise you.
- On a much lighter note, I was thrilled to hear that Amanda (5A) was so enthralled with 5A's class reading book (Wolf Brother) that she persuaded her dad to buy a copy for her and she is currently reading it to him!! Dad gets a bedtime story every night!!
- And today, we celebrated NSPCC Number Day by carrying out a plethora of outdoor activities based around learning our times tables. I watched Year 6 carry out a frenzied treasure hunt in the Quad, Year 2 running relays passing the bean bag whilst reciting times tables facts and Year 1 collecting letters as they counted in order in 5s and 10s - the letters then spelled out a well known phrase!
- The kitchen is now in it's 4th week of refurbishment!!! That '2 weeks tops' promise is clearly down the pan!! And there appears to be snag after snag cropping up the latest being the flooring which was dropped as they carried it into school and now has small bulges every two or three feet! The builders thought it would flatten out as people walked on it! Good grief alive! Where's that 'hand on face' emoji yet again!!! Whatever next!
- And that brings us to the end of this week's newsletter. It just remains for me to wish you a wonderful weekend and I leave you with this thought:

"Use social media to inspire, not to compare and your life will be fulfilled not failing to measure up!"


