Dear Parents / Carers,

So I have to give the biggest shout out to our teachers who stepped up immediately and had work online for all year groups within hours of the bubbles closing. There has been some amazing work on SeeSaw – teachers have been using SeeSaw and Zoom to liaise with their classes and children have been sending work back enjoying this new-fangled way of working.

But the week hasn't been without its stresses and strains for teachers. At one point in the week, I popped into Miss Howard's room to see how she was getting on and, without even looking up from her work, she shouted at me, "GO AWAY!" Well!! I lowered my head and retreated in silence and told myself that teachers are scared and worried and I must be understanding about everyone's different ways of reacting to stress. I returned to my office, a little crest-fallen it has to be said, and I continued with the mountain of emails I had to answer when up popped an email from Miss Howard sent to all the staff apologising for her outburst at whoever it

was who'd entered her classroom. Apparently, she'd been right in the middle of filming herself reading 'Mr Rude' for her children and when she shouted "GO AWAY!" she was being 'Mr Rude' and couldn't look up from her book! Well, she should take up acting is all *I* can say – she frightened the living daylights out of me!

In other news, we've had the school deep cleaned despite the advice from Public Health that a deep clean is pointless at this point but it makes us all feel a little safer so, from that point of view, it's worth it.

Thank you for all the compliments regarding the flower boxes we placed in our entrance drive and thank you to those of you who continuously picked the flowers up as they flew out of the boxes on windy days!!! I've given up placing them all back in — I'll have to find some kind of super glue to keep them stuck in.

I'd like to end with a big thank you to those of you who emailed us with your support. I lay awake half the night worrying about the effect our school closure would have, particularly on our working parents. And, although I would have liked to have kept the school open, if at all possible, I came to the realisation that our children's health and safety is far more important.

Our staff members who have been struck down by this deadly virus are very ill and suffering greatly – those of you who've had the misfortune to have experienced the virus themselves, will know how awful it can be for some people so our thoughts and prayers are with them all.

It's been quite a week and one that I never want to live through again so the weekend can't come soon enough for me and I'm sure all of *you* feel exactly the same.

I wish you all a peaceful weekend filled with love, good health and a whole lot of cuddles and I leave you with this:

'Spend time with those you love. One of these days, you will say either, "I wish I had" or "I'm glad I did." '




